
## **Description**

The ACPL-P314/W314 consists of a GaAsP LED optically coupled to an integrated circuit with a power output stage. 


Figure 1. V<sub>OH</sub> vs. Temperature.




Figure 3. V<sub>OH</sub> vs. I<sub>OH</sub>.




Figure 5. I<sub>OL</sub> vs. Temperature.




Figure 2.  $I_{OH}$  vs. Temperature.




Figure 4. V<sub>OL</sub> vs. Temperature.




Figure 6.  $V_{0L}$  vs.  $I_{0L}$ .




Figure 7.  $I_{CC}$  vs. Temperature.




Figure 9. I<sub>FLH</sub> vs. Temperature.




Figure 11. Propagation Delay vs. If.




Figure 8. Icc vs. Vcc.




Figure 10. Propagation Delay vs.  $V_{CC}$ .




Figure 12. Propagation Delay vs. Temperature.




Figure 13. Propagation Delay vs. Rg.




Figure 15. Transfer Characteristics.




Figure 17. Propagation Delay Test Circuit and Waveforms.




Figure 18. CMR Test Circuit and Waveforms.




Figure 14. Propagation Delay vs. Cg.






Figure 16. Input Current vs. Forward Voltage.

## **Eliminating Negative IGBT Gate Drive**

To keep the IGBT firmly off, the ACPL-P314/W314 has a very low maximum V<sub>OL</sub> specification of 1.0 V. Minimizing  $R_{\alpha}$  and the lead inductance from the ACPL-P314/W314 to the IGBT gate and emitter (possibly by mounting the ACPL-P314/W314 on a small PC board directly above the IGBT) can eliminate the need for negative IGBT gate drive in many applications as shown in Figure 19. Care should be taken with such a PC board design to avoid routing the IGBT collector or emitter traces close to the ACPL-P314/W314 input as this can result in unwanted coupling of transient signals into the input of ACPL-P314/W314 and degrade performance. (If the IGBT drain must be routed near the ACPL-P314/W314 input, then the LED should be reverse biased when in the off state, to prevent the transient signals coupled from the IGBT drain from turning on the ACPL-P314/W314.

## Selecting the Gate Resistor (Rg)

Step 1: Calculate  $R_g$  minimum from the  $I_{OL}$  peak specification. The IGBT and  $R_g$  in Figure 19 can be analyzed as a simple RC circuit with a voltage supplied by the ACPL-P314/W314.

$$R_g \stackrel{3}{=} \frac{V_{CC} - V_{OL}}{I_{OLPEAK}}$$
$$= \frac{24 - 5}{0.6}$$
$$= 32 \Omega$$

The  $V_{OL}$  value of 5 V in the previous equation is the  $V_{OL}$  at the peak current of 0.6A. (See Figure 6).

Step 2: Check the ACPL-P314/W314 power dissipation and increase  $R_g$  if necessary. The ACPL-P314/W314 total power dissipation ( $P_T$ ) is equal to the sum of the emitter power ( $P_E$ ) and the output power ( $P_O$ ).

$$\begin{split} &P_T = P_E + P_0 \\ &P_E = I_F \bullet V_F \bullet DutyCycle \\ &P_0 = P_{0(BIAS)} + P_{0(SWITCHING)} = I_{CC} \bullet V_{CC} + E_{SW} \ (R_g; Q_g) \bullet f \\ &= (I_{CCBIAS} + K_{ICC} \bullet Q_g \bullet f) \bullet V_{CC} + E_{SW} \ (R_g; Q_g) \bullet f \end{split}$$

where  $K_{ICC} \cdot Q_g \cdot f$  is the increase in  $I_{CC}$  due to switching and  $K_{ICC}$  is a constant of 0.001 mA/(nC\*kHz). For the circuit in Figure 19 with  $I_F$  (worst case) = 10 mA,  $R_g$  = 32  $\Omega$ , Max Duty Cycle = 80%,  $Q_g$  = 100 nC, f = 20 kHz and  $T_{AMAX}$  = 85°C:

$$\begin{split} P_E &= 10 \text{ mA} \bullet 1.8 \text{V} \bullet 0.8 = 14 \text{ mW} \\ P_0 &= (3 \text{ mA} + (0.001 \text{ mA/nC} \bullet \text{ kHz}) \bullet 20 \text{ kHz} \bullet 100 \text{ nC}) \bullet 24 \text{V} + \\ & 0.4 \, \mu \text{J} \bullet 20 \text{ kHz} = 128 \text{ mW £ 250 mW ($P_{0\text{(MAX)}}$@85 °C)} \end{split}$$

The value of 3 mA for  $I_{CC}$  in the previous equation is the max.  $I_{CC}$  over entire operating temperature range.

Since  $P_O$  for this case is less than  $P_{O(MAX)}$ ,  $R_g = 32~\Omega$  is alright for the power dissipation.




Figure 20. Energy Dissipated in the ACPL-P314/W314 and for Each IGBT Switching Cycle.




Figure 19. Recommended LED Drive and Application Circuit for ACPL-P314/W314

# LED Drive Circuit Considerations for Ultra High CMR Performance




Figure 21. Optocoupler Input to Output Capacitance Model for Unshielded Optocouplers.




Figure 22. Optocoupler Input to Output Capacitance Model for Shielded Optocouplers.

Without a detector shield, the dominant cause of optocoupler CMR failure is capacitive coupling from the input side of the optocoupler, through the package, to the detector IC as shown in Figure 21. The ACPL-P314/W314 improves CMR performance by using a detector IC with an optically transparent Faraday shield, which diverts the capacitively coupled current away from the sensitive IC circuitry. However, this shield does not eliminate the capacitive coupling between the LED and optocoupler pins 5-8 as shown in Figure 22. This capacitive coupling causes perturbations in the LED current during common mode transients and becomes the major source of CMR failures for a shielded optocoupler. The main design objective of a high CMR LED drive circuit becomes keeping the LED in the proper state (on or off) during common mode transients. For example, the recommended application circuit (Figure 19), can achieve 10 kV/µs CMR while minimizing component complexity.

Techniques to keep the LED in the proper state are discussed in the next two sections.

## CMR with the LED On (CMR<sub>H</sub>)

A high CMR LED drive circuit must keep the LED on during common mode transients. This is achieved by overdriving the LED current beyond the input threshold so that it is not pulled below the threshold during a transient. A minimum LED current of 8 mA provides adequate margin over the maximum  $I_{FLH}$  of 5 mA to achieve 10 kV/ $\mu$ s CMR.

## CMR with the LED Off (CMRL)




Figure 23. Equivalent Circuit for Figure 17 During Common Mode Transient.

A high CMR LED drive circuit must keep the LED off ( $V_F \le V_{F(OFF)}$ ) during common mode transients. For example, during a -dV<sub>CM</sub>/dt transient in Figure 23, the current flowing through  $C_{LEDP}$  also flows through the  $R_{SAT}$  and  $V_{SAT}$  of the logic gate. As long as the low state voltage developed across the logic gate is less than  $V_{F(OFF)}$  the LED will remain off and no common mode failure will occur.




Figure 24. Not Recommended Open Collector Drive Circuit.

The open collector drive circuit, shown in Figure 24, can not keep the LED off during a  $+dV_{CM}/dt$  transient, since all the current flowing through CLEDN must be supplied by the LED, and it is not recommended for applications requiring ultra high CMR1 performance. The alternative drive circuit which like the recommended application circuit (Figure 19), does achieve ultra high CMR performance by shunting the LED in the off state.





Figure 25. Recommended LED Drive Circuit for Ultra-High CMR Dead Time and Propagation Delay Specifications.

## **Dead Time and Propagation Delay Specifications**


The ACPL-P314/W314 includes a Propagation Delay Difference (PDD) specification intended to help designers minimize "dead time" in their power inverter designs. Dead time is the time high and low side power transistors are off. Any overlap in QI and Q2 conduction will result in large currents flowing through the power devices from the high voltage to the low-voltage motor rails. To minimize dead time in a given design, the turn on of LED2 should be delayed (relative to the turn off of LED1) so that under worst-case conditions, transistor Q1 has just turned off when transistor Q2 turns on, as shown in Figure 26. The amount of delay necessary to achieve this condition is equal to the maximum value of the propagation delay difference specification, PDD max, which is specified to be 500 ns over the operating temperature range of -40° to 100°C.

Delaying the LED signal by the maximum propagation delay difference ensures that the minimum dead time is zero, but it does not tell a designer what the maximum dead time will be. The maximum dead time is equivalent to the difference between the maximum and minimum propagation delay difference specification as shown in Figure 27. The maximum dead time for the ACPL-P314/W314 is 1  $\mu$ s (= 0.5  $\mu$ s - (-0.5  $\mu$ s)) over the operating temperature range of -40°C to 100°C.

Note that the propagation delays used to calculate PDD and dead time are taken at equal temperatures and test conditions since the optocouplers under consideration are typically mounted in close proximity to each other and are switching identical IGBTs.

- T<sub>1</sub>: Junction temperature of LED (°C).

## **Description**

This thermal model assumes that an 6-pin single-channel plastic package optocoupler is soldered into a 7.62 cm x 7.62 cm printed circuit board (PCB). The temperature at the LED and Detector junctions of the optocoupler can be calculated using the equations below.

$$T_1 = (R_{11} * P_1 + R_{12} * P_2) + T_a - (1)$$

$$T_2 = (R_{21} * P_1 + R_{22} * P_2) + T_a - (2)$$
