




Figure 1. Power Dissipation vs. Ambient Temperature




Figure 2. Supply Voltage vs. Ambient Temperature






Figure 3. Forward Current (Light On) vs. Supply Voltage




Figure 4. Forward Current (Light On) vs. Amb. Temperature




Figure 5. Forward Current (Light Off) vs. Amb. Temperature




Figure 6. Blinking Threshold Voltage vs. Amb. Temperature




Figure 7. Blinking Frequency vs. Supply Voltage




Figure 8. Blinking Frequency vs. Ambient Temperature






Figure 9. Duty Cycle vs. Supply Voltage




Figure 12. Relative Luminous Intensity vs. Amb. Temperature




Figure 10. Duty Cycle vs. Ambient Temperature




Figure 13. Relative Intensity vs. Wavelength




Figure 11. Luminous Intensity vs. Supply Voltage







Figure 14. Rel. Luminous Intensity vs. Angular Displacement

Ozone Depleting Substances Policy Statement

It is the policy of Vishay Semiconductor GmbH to

- 1. Meet all present and future national and international statutory requirements.
- Regularly and continuously improve the performance of our products, processes, distribution and operatingsystems with respect to their impact on the health and safety of our employees and the public, as well as their impact on the environment.

It is particular concern to control or eliminate releases of those substances into the atmosphere which are known as ozone depleting substances (ODSs).

- 3. Council Decision 88/540/EEC and 91/690/EEC Annex A, B and C (transitional substances) respectively.

Vishay Semiconductor GmbH can certify that our semiconductors are not manufactured with ozone depleting substances and do not contain such substances.
