DESCRIPTION

The PCA9543 is a bi-directional translating switch, controlled by the I²C-bus. The SCL/SDA upstream pair fans out to two downstream pairs, or channels. Any individual SCx/SDx channels or combination of channels can be selected, determined by the contents of the programmable control register. Two interrupt inputs, $\overline{\text{INT0}}$ to $\overline{\text{INT3}}$, one for each of the downstream pairs, are provided. One interrupt output $\overline{\text{INT}}$, which acts as an AND of the two interrupt inputs, is provided.

An active-LOW reset input allows the PCA9543 to recover from a situation where one of the downstream $\rm I^2C$ -buses is stuck in a LOW state. Pulling the RESET pin LOW resets the $\rm I^2C$ state machine and causes all the channels to be deselected, as does the internal power on reset function.

The pass gates of the switches are constructed such that the $\rm V_{DD}$ pin can be used to limit the maximum high voltage which will be passed by the PCA9543. This allows the use of different bus voltages on each SCx/SDx pair, so that 1.8 V, 2.5 V, or 3.3 V parts can communicate with 5 V parts without any additional protection. External pull-up resistors pull the bus up to the desired voltage level for each channel. All I/O pins are 5 V tolerant.




Figure 1. Pin configuration

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BLOCK DIAGRAM




Figure 2. Block diagram

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DEVICE ADDRESS




Figure 3. Slave address

Following a START condition the bus master must output the address of the slave it is accessing. The address of the PCA9543 is shown in Figure 3. To conserve power, no internal pull-up resistors are incorporated on the hardware selectable address pins and they must be pulled HIGH or LOW.

The last bit of the slave address defines the operation to be performed. When set to logic 1, a read is selected while a logic 0 selects a write operation.

CONTROL REGISTER

Following the successful acknowledgement of the slave address, the bus master will send a byte to the PCA9543, which will be stored in the control register. If multiple bytes are received by the PCA9543, it will save the last byte received. This register can be written and read via the I²C-bus.




Figure 4. Control Register

CONTROL REGISTER DEFINITION

One or several SCx/SDx downstream pair, or channel, is selected by the contents of the control register. This register is written after the PCA9543 has been addressed. The 2 LSBs of the control byte are used to determine which channel is to be selected. When a channel is selected, the channel will become active after a stop condition has been placed on the I²C-bus. This ensures that all SCx/SDx lines will be in a HIGH state when the channel is made active, so that no false conditions are generated at the time of connection

NOTE: Channel 0 and 1 can be enabled at the same time. Care should be taken not to exceed the maximum bus capacitance.

INTERRUPT HANDLING

The PCA9543 provides 2 interrupt inputs, one for each channel, and one open drain interrupt output. When an interrupt is generated by any device, it will be detected by the PCA9543 and the interrupt output will be driven LOW. The channel need not be active for detection of the interrupt. A bit is also set in the Control Register.

Bits 4 – 5 of the Control Register correspond to the $\overline{\text{INT0}}$ and $\overline{\text{INT1}}$ inputs of the PCA9543, respectively. Therefore, if an interrupt is generated by any device connected to channel 1, the state of the interrupt inputs is loaded into the control register when a read is accomplished. Likewise, an interrupt on any device connected to channel 0 would cause bit 4 of the control register to be set on the read. The master can then address the PCA9543 and read the contents of the Control Register to determine which channel contains the device generating the interrupt. The master can then reconfigure the PCA9543 to select this channel, and locate the device generating the interrupt and clear it.

It should be noted that more than one device can be providing an interrupt on a channel, so it is up to the master to ensure that all devices on a channel are interrogated for an interrupt.

The interrupt inputs may be used as general purpose inputs if the interrupt feature is not required.

If unused, interrupt input(s) must be connected to $\ensuremath{V_{DD}}$ through a pull-up resistor.

RESET INPUT

The RESET input is an active-LOW signal which may be used to recover from a bus fault condition. By asserting this signal LOW for a minimum of t_{WL} , the PCA9543 will reset its registers and I^2C state machine and will deselect all channels. The $\overline{\text{RESET}}$ input must be connected to V_{DD} through a pull-up resistor.

POWER-ON RESET

When power is applied to V_{DD} , an internal Power-On Reset holds the PCA9543 in a reset state until V_{DD} has reached V_{POR} . At this point, the reset condition is released and the PCA9543 registers and I^2C state machine are initialized to their default states, all zeroes causing all the channels to be deselected.

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VOLTAGE TRANSLATION

The pass gate transistors of the PCA9543 are constructed such that the V_{DD} voltage can be used to limit the maximum voltage that will be passed from one I²C-bus to another.




Figure 5. V_{pass} voltage

Figure 5 shows the voltage characteristics of the pass gate transistors (note that the graph was generated using the data specified in the DC Characteristics section of this datasheet). In order for the PCA9543 to act as a voltage translator, the V_{pass} voltage should be equal to, or lower than the lowest bus voltage. For example, if the main bus was running at 5 V, and the downstream buses were 3.3 V and 2.7 V, then V_{pass} should be equal to or below 2.7 V to effectively clamp the downstream bus voltages. Looking at Figure 5, we see that V_{pass} (max.) will be at 2.7 V when the PCA9543 supply voltage is 3.5 V or lower so the PCA9543 supply voltage could be set to 3.3 V. Pull-up resistors can then be used to bring the bus voltages to their appropriate levels (see Figure 12).

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CHARACTERISTICS OF THE I²C-BUS

The I²C-bus is for 2-way, 2-line communication between different ICs or modules. The two lines are a serial data line (SDA) and a serial clock line (SCL). Both lines must be connected to a positive supply via a pull-up resistor when connected to the output stages of a device. Data transfer may be initiated only when the bus is not busy.

Bit transfer




Figure 6. Bit transfer

One data bit is transferred during each clock pulse. The data on the SDA line must remain stable during the HIGH period of the clock pulse as changes in the data line at this time will be interpreted as control signals (see Figure 6).

Start and stop conditions




Figure 7. Definition of start and stop conditions

Both data and clock lines remain HIGH when the bus is not busy. A HIGH-to-LOW transition of the data line, while the clock is HIGH is defined as the start condition (S). A LOW-to-HIGH transition of the data line while the clock is HIGH is defined as the stop condition (P) (see Figure 7).

System configuration




Figure 8. System configuration

A device generating a message is a transmitter: a device receiving is the receiver. The device that controls the message is the master and the devices which are controlled by the master are the slaves (see Figure 8).

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Acknowledge

The number of data bytes transferred between the start and the stop conditions from transmitter to receiver is not limited. Each byte of eight bits is followed by one acknowledge bit. The acknowledge bit is a HIGH level put on the bus by the transmitter whereas the master generates an extra acknowledge related clock pulse.

A slave receiver which is addressed must generate an acknowledge after the reception of each byte. Also a master must generate an acknowledge after the reception of each byte that has been clocked out of the slave transmitter. The device that acknowledges has to pull down the SDA line during the acknowledge clock pulse, so that the SDA line is stable LOW during the HIGH period of the acknowledge related clock pulse, set-up and hold times must be taken into account.

A master receiver must signal an end of data to the transmitter by not generating an acknowledge on the last byte that has been clocked out of the slave. In this event, the transmitter must leave the data line HIGH to enable the master to generate a stop condition.




Figure 9. Acknowledgement on the I²C-bus




Figure 10. WRITE Control Register




Figure 11. READ Control Register




Figure 12. Typical application





Figure 13. Definition of timing on the I²C-bus


